

"Your Identity" by Pastor Chris Waldvogel, Jr. Counselor



What will you wear today? When it comes to earthly clothes, what you put on depends on several factors. What do you have in your wardrobe? Is it clean? What will the weather be like? Where will you be going? What will you be doing? Who will be with you? Because of changing circumstances, you might be taking off and putting on several outfits, layers or looks each day.

Christians also face this malady when it comes to the inclinations of the heart. In his letter to the church in Colossae, Paul points the baptized to a glorious dress not made by human hands but by God. The apostle reminds the baptized that through water and the Word, God has clothed them with and united them to Jesus. The same power that raised Christ from the dead is at work in them through baptism. Through this glorious life-giving means, they are made alive with Christ.

Paul writes: "In him, you were also circumcised with a circumcision not performed by human hands. Your whole self ruled by the flesh was put off when you were circumcised by Christ, having been buried with him in baptism, in which you were also raised with him through your faith in the working of God, who raised him from the dead," (Colossians 2:11-12, NIV).

Paul's message is for you, too. By God's almighty power, God prunes your old, dead sinful nature. By the Holy Spirit, God effects (brings about, causes, achieves) a change in your will, heart and mind. You believe and love God and desire to do His will, embracing through faith that your sin had been forgiven on account of Christ alone.

But like a worn sneaker, ripped pants or stained shirt that you can't seem to part with, the Old Adam lives to undo God's glorious makeover by tempting you to remain comfortable with your filthy, disgusting, stinky, dead self. In Christ, you have a glorious dress that covers all your sin and a heart made new. You have been raised with Christ. You don't have to go looking elsewhere for something more glorious.

When it comes to your baptismal identity and dress, Paul (and God) don't want you taking off and putting on several outfits, layers or looks. Paul (and God) don't want your attitudes, inclinations and actions shifting with every new circumstance. Instead, the apostle exhorts:

"Put to death therefore what is earthly in you: sexual immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire, and covetousness, which is idolatry. On account of these the wrath of God is coming. In these you too once walked, when you were living in them. But now you must put them all away: anger, wrath, malice, slander, and obscene talk from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have put off the old self with its practices and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge after the image of its creator," (Colossians 3:5-10).

"Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony," (Colossians 3:12-14).

Thanks be to God your baptismal identity is grounded in God's promises and actions, not your promises and actions. To hold onto this reality through faith, come to the rich storehouse of God's mercy and Christ in Jesus and the means where God keeps you clinging to what He has laid out for you: "And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him," (Colossians 3:15-17).

Who Keeps Your History? by Nikki Rahlf

What is an archivist? What is a historian? Aren't they the same?

An archivist is one who takes care of the archives. The archives are the material saved that is of historical significance. It is the task of the archivist to appraise all materials for the archives. For the archivist it is: when in doubt "save". An item can be discarded later but not replaced if thrown.

The historian writes the history. The history should always include the who, what, where, when, and why of the story.

Each day we make history. God is at work in your life every day. Is keeping history a good thing? From Job 36:24 and Psalm 111:4a we read "remember God's works" so historians are "Ministers of Remembering".

Church history is the documented record of the works of our Savior as He worked through out the past as well as now in the present. Church history serves as the carrier of our service to spread the Word of God to all.

How we remember our Lutheran Women's Missionary League's past not only reflects current attitudes, it helps to shape them. All past events are interesting to the Christian for in them we recognize the hand of God at work. Many societies were organized around specific functions, such as Altar Guild, Sewing Circles, or the more general Ladies Aid. Women saw needs or were told there was a specific need and worked toward filling those needs. That is still the case for the members of the LWML today. "We serve the Lord with gladness, wherever and whenever He has need of us".

With this said, I am asking every LWML Unit to please fill out the check list for Units. (it can be found on the LWML ND website, www.ndlwml.org/resources or I can mail you a copy). If you do not have a Unit Historian the Secretary can do it as she already has most of the information. This should then be sent to the Zone Historian so that she can compile a report from all the units and forward that report on to me. If your Unit or Zone doesn't have a historian, why not volunteer? As your District Historian, I am begging for reports so I in turn, can make my report.

The report is not hard! It asks mostly for numbers. Like: how many members; how many attend spring rally and fall rally; fall retreat; workshops; special events; prayer services; assembly of leaders; conventions. And then a brief history of activities the unit does during the year. Like: number of quilts made, or number of health, baby, or school kits made for Orphan Grain Train, activities held at nursing homes, and etc.

The names of officers and your church is only for the Zone Historian to keep on file. That is not forwarded onto District.

Our history is always changing and so it is important to document the things we do in service to our Lord. I encourage societies to keep accurate up-to-date histories. In time your grandchildren, great grandchildren, and others may read about what you and your LWML did to serve the Lord in gladness.
